### Mentor Program A Success in KCS Classes

You may have read some of the articles in the *Kenton Times* this past year about this exciting program in Hardin County. You may not have known, however, that last year Eastcrest and Northwood



Schools became the pilot schools for KCS for Big Brother/Big Sister. We have expanded this program and are now serving 8-10 children in each of these buildings. Students are referred by their teachers or other adults in the school. Matches are made

with KHS students, one child to one senior. Jill Ogle is the coordinator for this project, and John Neville oversees Big Brother/Big Sister for Hardin County. We are very appreciative that our children are being served.

One afternoon per week, the "Bigs", as they are called, come to meet with their younger counterparts and spend some time with them, playing games, doing projects, or just giving them some attention and time to talk or play outside. These younger children have been referred for many different reasons, but all of them look forward to their time when an older student can give them undivided attention. Often moms and dads work difficult schedules, and some rarely see their children due to night shifts. Teachers with 23 or more children in a class are already spread too thin to offer individual time such as this.

Thanks to our faithful high school students who come each week to give that important one-on-one time to our children. The program is beneficial to both the "Bigs" and the "Littles!"

### From the Nurse's Office



Brenda Jennings, KHS Class of '66, has been the KCS nurse for 6 years. I am Brenda Jennings, R.N., B.A., Kenton City Schools' Nurse. In this newsletter I will provide health awareness topics relative to children ages 4 thru 19, as well as opportunities for you to receive help for your children.

The Kenton-Hardin Health Department received word in December that they are now permitted to administer VFC (Gardasil) vaccine to children who are underinsured in addition to those who are Medicaid eligible, uninsured, and Amercian Indian or Alaskan Native. Underinsured is defined as those who have health insurance which has no coverage for immunizations.

If you are interested in this series of three vaccines for your daughter, please go to the Kenton-Hardin Health Department on Thursdays 8:30 A.M. till 12:00 P.M. and 1:00 P.M. till 4:30 P.M. For questions about this vaccine, please call the health department at 419-673-6230.

If you have children who will be entering preschool and kindergarten this fall, please locate and review their immunization records as well as their birth certificates. Both of these documents are required for entry into either the Kenton City Schools Preschool or Kindergarten.

For kindergarten entry, your child should have 5 DtAP, 4 Polio, 3 Hepatitis B, 2 MMRs, and the Varicella (chickenpox) vaccines.

For the preschool aged child, either three- or four-year-olds, vaccine scheduled shots are based on the age of the child. Please check with either the health department (419-673-6230) or your child's physician as to what your child may need for entry.

All vaccines are to be up to date prior to the start of school in August 2009. A physical exam must be completed dated January 1, 2009, and beyond for entry into preschool and kindergarten. Preschool requires a dental

As the new curriculum director for the Kenton City Schools, my mission is to provide leadership, service, and support for the development and implementation of research-based curriculum and instructional methodologies to ensure all students achieve their highest academic potential. In working with the administration and staff, I am truly impressed with their dedication and desire for excellence and am confident the district is heading in the right direction.

With the goal of increasing academic achievement for all students, many new programs, curricular materials, and professional development opportunities

have been provided already this year. For example, Westview and Espy elementaries are implementing a web-based assessment, intervention, and progress monitoring system called AIMSweb. Marilyn Link

provided a workshop titled, "Using Problem Solving Techniques to Teach Mathematics" to first grade teachers across the district. A supplemental science and social studies curriculum was purchased to assist the 3-5 teachers in teaching the Ohio Indicators in those areas. Leadership teams have been formed at the district and building levels to create improvement plans for the upcoming year. Leadership teams have visited other schools to look literacy and intervention at their programs. Finally, Eve Hayes, a literacy consultant, will be spending several weeks in our district helping to establish a "Balanced Literacy Framework."

This is only a small representation of what has occurred in the district so far and only a glimpse of what the future holds.

#### Scholarships and Tests

The guidance office receives information about scholarships available to graduating seniors. A list of scholarships and scholarship search websites was given to seniors December 1st. This list is updated monthly.

### When should a student take the ACT test for college admission?

ACT recommends juniors take the test toward the end of their junior year and again the beginning of their senior year. Because this test is curriculum based, the more college preparatory coursework a student has taken, the better prepared he/she will be. The ACT is required for admission to four-year colleges and for some two-year colleges, for those interested in a health field or possible transfer to a four-year college.

### New at KHS for 2009-2010

Beginning next year, Kenton High School juniors will have the opportunity to apply for and participate in a new Dual Enrollment Program which allows the students to receive high school credit as well as college credit for coursework successfully completed here at KHS. We have applied for admission to programs at University of Findlay and Wright State University. We will be offering (upon university approval) AP English 4 and Calculus as dual enrollment courses. In order to participate in the program, students must have at least a 3.2 GPA, completed an application, and be accepted into the university. The coursework will be very rigorous and at a college level. Grades for these courses will be included in the students' GPA and class rank. We are excited about this new program, and more information will be available to students and parents in March.

We will also be offering a new creative writing class for interested students in grades 9-12. This one-half credit semester course is designed to help students improve writing skills by analyzing and modeling published authors. They will use technology to compose, edit, and publish writings. Students will compile a portfolio of writings including poetry, short stories, scripts, characterizations, descriptions, etc. to be used for course evaluation.

#### Foreign Exchange Students

Every year the high school has four exchange students; this year we were lucky to receive five. We encourage these exchanges to open our American students' eyes to other ways of life. These five students have come into our school and have given background presentations of their countries to our students. We know it has been an adjustment for them, but we welcome them and their contributions to our school. We learn as much from them as they learn from us!

### KMS Works on "Making Middle Grades Work"

During the past year Kenton Middle School has become involved in the Making Middle Grades Work initiative. The parent organization is the Southern Regional Education Board (SREB). There are many facets to the plan, but underlying all of them is the goal of teaching a rigorous curriculum which will prepare students for high school, further studies, and careers. We believe most students can be successful in this curriculum if it is taught in an environment that encourages them to succeed.

SREB has identifies 10 essential elements that create such an environment. They advise schools to begin working with only two or three of these so as not spread the energy too thin. At KMS, we have committed to the following elements.

**Literacy**- Writing and reading are skills that impact all curriculum areas. As part of the KMS program, students are writing more and more effectively than ever. Last fall our faculty received training in Collins Writing. This is a format that helps students to be more precise, to the point, and accurate when writing. There has also been an increased amount of cross-curriculum writing. Students are being assessed and receiving credit for their writing in more that one subject for the same paper.

**Numeracy**- Of equal importance is our students' ability to use numbers. This committee has a dual focus. One is our students' math skills. Math vocabulary has become a focus in an effort to be consistent throughout our building with Ohio Indicators both in practice and during class time. Additionally, this committee is responsible for the collection of data to evaluate the effectiveness of methods and strategies used by the various teams.


**High expectations/extra help**- Perhaps the greatest emphasis school-wide to this point has been to stress the importance of daily work and its completion in a timely manner. Called "The Power of I", the idea is that homework in not optional. Doing homework during free time at lunch, before and after school, and other times as arranged encourages students to do this work when it is convenient for them instead. Not only do student's grades improve due to less incomplete work, students experience success which promotes better work habits. *Continued on page 11.*





### Lady Wildcat Basketball Looking Forward

The Kenton girls' basketball coaching staff, led by head coach **Julie Porter**, is committed and determined to change the program in a new direction.

This year the Lady Little Dribblers is showing great promise with nearly 50 girls coming to practice. The coaches are teaching the girls fundamentals at a young age- 3rd and 4th grade -preparing them with the skills they need to

b e successful once they get to middle school and high school. Through the help o f volunteer the coaches, Lady Little Dribblers practice twice a

week for two months and will have the opportunity to show off their skills to community and parents during the JV and Varsity home games on Feb. 12. "I am pleased to see so many young girls are interested in basketball because teaching fundaments at this age is so vital," Coach Porter said.

Kenton girls also have the opportunity to play on 5th and 6th grade teams before they get to middle school. The girls practice together for two months then are put on teams to compete against other schools. This year Kenton has two 5th grade

teams and three 6th grade teams. These teams will compete on Saturdays for five weeks in the USV league, travel to Ada to participate weekend in а tournament, and finally play in the Kenton 5th and 6th grade tournament.

Porter acknowledged, "The 5th and 6th grade program would not b e possible

without the community support of volunteer coaches who do a terrific job." She added that h t e program is open to girls free of cost and every girl is

on a team. "That would not be

possible without my staff of coaches and support from the community. Ι a m very thankful for all that m y coaches do and the support we

get from the community to help develop a program."

Continuing in the 7th and 8th grade, the basketball coaching staff looks to build on each year and is committed to developing players who are able to compete in our tough conference. At the high school level things have changed already with

> numbers increasing drastically. This year a freshman coach was added to the leading staff, the freshman team in a full schedule. The coaching staff

looks to continue to have freshman, JV, and varsity teams each year to help further develop the athletes' skills throughout high school.

Porter remarked, "I am very passionate about the game of basketball and love teaching it and helping kids reach their full potential. I am very pleased to have a coaching staff on board with me with similar qualities that will help develop this program. Even with the adversity that has been handed to my varsity team with two devastating injuries to my seniors, I still enjoy coaching

the girls. Each day I tell the girls it's another opportunity for us to work hard and get better. And in the end that's what

it is all about, getting better and winning some games."

### Weather Delay Information

**ONE-HOUR DELAY** means that everything is set back one hour for all students. Students should be at their bus stop one hour later than usual. School will be dismissed at regular time.

**TWO-HOUR DELAY** means to report to the bus stop or school two hours later than usual. School will be dismissed at regular time. No A.M. preschool.

**THREE-HOUR DELAY** means to report to the bus stop or school three hours later than usual. School will be dismissed one hour later than usual. No A.M. preschool.

*PLEASE DO NOT CALL THE SCHOOL TO CHECK ON SCHOOL DELAYS.* Open phone lines are important to receive input from bus drivers, law enforcement agencies, and other schools (such as Hi Point). When a decision is made to delay or cancel school, the radio and TV stations are the first to be notified. The following will make the announcements:

**ATHLETIC DELAYS OR CANCELLATIONS:** When school is closed due to weather, evening activities are sometimes held if the weather conditions improve during the day. Therefore, decisions about evening events are usually made sometime after 1:00 P.M. and are broadcast over WKTN.

**EARLY DISMISSALS:** Once we are in session, unplanned early dismissals are highly unlikely. Sending students, especially younger ones, home where there may not be a parent or they may not be able to get in out of the weather creates a much more dangerous situation than waiting a couple hours to dismiss. We have highly dedicated, caring, and skilled bus drivers who have safety as their number one priority. However, if parents feel that the weather is so bad that their students need to go home early, they can always pick them up at school.



**COLD WEATHER AND CANCELLATIONS:** Parents are encouraged to visit NOAA National Weather Service website on cold and windchill at (http://www.weather.gov/os/windchill/index.shtml). Temperatures of 0 degrees or a windchill factor of –15 or so is considered in the safe area, especially if the sun is shining. These temperatures may be uncomfortable but are not dangerous. As a rule of thumb, anytime the temperature gets to –18 or below for a windchill factor, school would be delayed or closed. You will notice when looking at the chart on the website that it does not take a lot of wind if the actual temperature is below 0 degrees to reach the –18 windchill factor.

Advisement and guidance- Communication between school and home is an important function of this element. Ideas that are being developed include e-mails from teachers to parents, promotion of the capacity to view grades online, and development of newsletters at the team and building level. Also included in the KMS site action plan is the development and implementation of an advisor/advisee program. Under this, all students would be teamed with a staff member to assist with the transition to middle school and on to high school.

The strategies being put in place are designed to motivate students while modifying attitudes and habits. While these elements are not new, the methods being used to accomplish them are. This program is totally planned, organized, and implemented by the faculty and staff. 
