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Important Immunization Information

All Kenton City Schools' incoming kindergarten students for the fall of 2010 will be required to have a 2nd varicella (chickenpox) vaccine before the start of school in August 2010. Children can receive this vaccine at the Kenton Hardin Health Department. The cost is \$10. If your child is on Medicaid, please take his Medicaid card with you at the time the shot is given. Health Department shot clinics are held on Thursdays from 8:30 A.M. until noon and 1:00 P.M. until 4:00 P.M. Please bring or send proof of this vaccine to Westview Kindergarten Center, 401 Scott Ave., Kenton, OH 43326, before the start of the 2010-11 school year. Your child will not be allowed to attend school until this vaccine has been given.

All Kenton City Schools' incoming 7th grade students for the fall of 2010 will be required to have a DPT booster vaccine before the start of school in August 2010. Children can receive this vaccine at the Kenton Hardin Health Department. The cost is \$10. If your child is on Medicaid, please take his Medicaid card with you at the time the shot is given. Health Department shot clinics are held on Thursdays from 8:30 A.M. until noon and 1:00 P.M. until 4:00 P.M. Please bring or send proof of this vaccine to Kenton Middle School, 300 Oriental St., Kenton, OH 43326, before the start of the 2010-11 school year. Your child will not be allowed to attend school until this vaccine has been given.

Discount Prescription Cards Available

Kenton City Schools has received notice of availability of free discount prescription cards from American Consultants Rx., Inc. This company will continue to provide this nationwide community service project. These cards will arrive at some short-term, future date and are free to families who are uninsured, under-insured, or on Medicare, not Medicaid. There is no expiration date, no limits on usage, and no forms to complete. The cards are good at over 50,000 chain pharmacies such as Wal-Mart, K-Mart, Kroger, and Walgreens. These cards will assist families in receiving up to 40% discount on name-brand drugs and up to 60% discount on generic prescriptions.

Cuts Planned for Kenton City Schools

In a special meeting on March 1, 2010, the Kenton City School Board met to approve cutbacks for the 2010-11 school year. While these cutbacks will affect many aspects of the daily operations and longterm visions of the district, they are necessary because of a shortfall in the budget. 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Hardin Central Students Read for Points

Hardin Central's New Computer Based Incentive Reading Program: Prizes for Points

Children at Hardin Central are devouring books as they work to earn prizes and set goals to increase their reading comprehension skills. This new program helps match students with books at their appropriate reading level, taking into account vocabulary and comprehension. Reading Counts is being used as a management program to help guide the Independent Reading Time, which is part of the Balanced Literacy Framework.

To begin the program, a child must attain a reading level that demonstrates mastery over basic reading strategies and skills. The student then completes an extensive test on the Scholastic Reading Inventory program, which determines a lexile level for the specific child. The child then selects a book from his/her lexile range and reads the book independently. When the child feels he/she knows the book well, he/she logs onto the computer and completes a quiz on the Reading Counts site.

Upon successful completion of the quiz, the child is awarded points and completes his/her reading log, noting his/her individual results along the way. This process continues on a daily basis. And again, all of these tasks are completed independently.

Not only are the students earning points, but they are also receiving prizes based on the designated point values associated with the books. All prize levels earn a certificate of

recognition in addition to prizes.

Prizes include:

5 points = Wildcat bookmark

20 points = Wildcat pencil

45 points = Candy bar or a sugar-free treat

75 points = Wildcat notebook or a pass for an extra special area class

Acknowledgement on the morning announcements in addition to the following prizes:

100 points = Wildcat drawstring bag

150 points = Free book of student's choice

200 points = Wildcat T-shirt

250 points = Lunch with Principal, Mrs. Brien



Teacher **Gina Rogers** instructs parents on how to help their child with homework.





Along with the penny stall, the winter spirit week was filled with other activities including specific dress days such as 80's/90's day, multiplicity day, cowboy/cowgirl day, and fashion disaster day. To further the spirit, music was played in the hallways between classes.

On the final day, students wore yellow, the official cancer awareness color of Synovial Sarcoma, in support of the Hollan family and a pep rally was held. Unlike the typical pep rally, this one included a relay race, in which classes competed against each other and the teachers, a student-versus-teacher dance off, and pies being thrown in the faces of **Mr. Thrush** and **Mr. Abbott.**

Mr. Abbott commented, "The students seem to really enjoy the activities throughout the week and we had great participation. There was an excitement in the air as donations from the penny stall poured in. Our students and staff

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KHS Offers Dual Enrollment

College is a big step in the life of a high school senior, and Kenton High School is making that step a lot easier by offering the Dual Enrollment Calculus I course. The course is offered through the University of Findlay and offers students four semester hours of

college credit. The Calculus I course is a way for high school seniors to experience the coursework they will encounter as freshmen in college. There are numerous benefits of dual enrollment courses, and those benefits are reaching Kenton High School and its seniors.

The Calculus I course includes the textbook, two projects, five calculus chapter materials, and a final exam. The course is offered free of charge as long as the student

achieves a passing grade of a C or higher. This is an opportunity for high school students to have a taste of college education and mathematics for free.

Numerous members of the community believe the Dual Enrollment Calculus I course is an excellent idea for Kenton High School. Megan Kearns, a parent of one student involved in the dual enrollment program said, "The option of dual enrollment has given students the opportunity to obtain more educational experiences during high school and encourages students to proceed in the direction of obtaining a higher education." Mrs. Deb Hord, Kenton High School's guidance secretary, said the dual enrollment is "making Kenton High School students better prepared for college." The dual enrollment is positive opportunity an altogether experience for students who attend Kenton High School.

Students Build Bridges of Learning

During the week of December 10–18, the students in **Ms. Baum's** Accelerated Geometry classes partnered to build bridges out of raw spaghetti noodles and mini marshmallows.

The assignment, created to show students how geometry skills are used in real-life situations, had certain requirements. Each bridge must be 18 inches long, three inches wide, and able to hold weight from an attached cup. The goal of the project was to have the strongest structure, consisting of only triangles, other than the base and the bottom/top of the bridge.

During the activity, students learned that many buildings and constructions in everyday life are made of triangular supports. They also learned how to properly use the solid structure of the triangle, and how to work together to be successful.

Winners of the competition were decided by how much their bridge held, or the efficiency of the bridge structure. The efficiency of each bridge was calculated by dividing the mass supported by the weight of the actual bridge.

In period 7, **Luke Abbott** and **Dakota DelValle** placed first, with an efficiency rating of 8.86. Following them in second place was **Kasey Shark** and **Alainy Krueger**, with an efficiency rating of 8.54. Third place was **Clayton Henson** and **Lara Dulin**, with an efficiency rating of 7.87. In period 5, **Seth Oberlitner** and **Joby Mowery** won first place with a 9.49 efficiency rating. Second place went to **Erica Beverly** and **Graham Reese**, with an efficiency of 8.62. Finally, **TJ Marvin** and **Andrea Thomas** had an 8.2 efficiency rating.

When asked about their favorite parts of the project, **Spence Bailey** and **McKenzie Ziegler** both had a lot to say. "I didn't think that spaghetti and marshmallows could actually withstand that much force," said Spence Bailey, laughing. "I suppose it's from the supporting aspects of the triangles. They are so buff."

McKenzie Ziegler agreed and further stated, "We learned how supportive things can be when made strategically and by using triangles. Also, we learned that triangles are used in everyday structures such as buildings, vehicles and bridges."

All of the students and Ms. Baum are looking forward to the projects that will come in the future.


