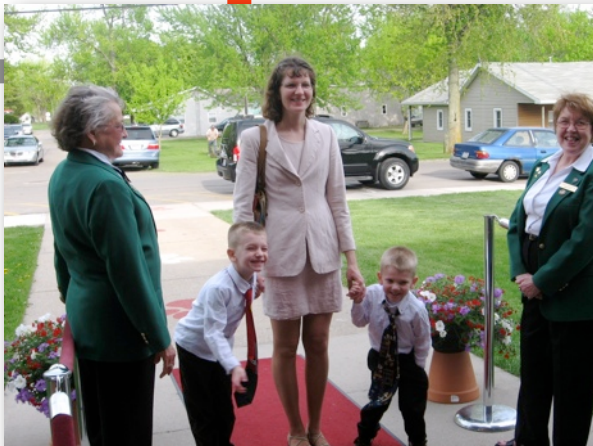

## KCS Nurse's News

Warm weather is finally here after a long, cold, dreary winter, and children are outside playing from dawn till dusk. As parents, we need to provide our children with and encourage them to use protective skin creams to prevent skin injury from the sun's harmful U.V. rays. Children are in a dynamic state of growth and are therefore more susceptible to environmental threats than adults. Many vital functions such as the immune system are not fully developed at birth, and unsafe environments may interfere with their normal development. It is very important that children be provided for and educated about taking care of their skin and eyes during sun exposure.

Some helpful ideas to protect your children include:

### **Limit time in the midday sun.**

The sun's UV rays are the strongest between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. To the extent possible, limit exposure to the sun during these hours.

### **Wear protective clothing.**

A hat with a wide brim offers good sun protection for the eyes, ears, face, and the back or the neck. Sunglasses that provide 99 to 100 percent UV-A and UV-B protection will greatly reduce eye damage from sun exposure. Tightly woven, loose fitting clothes will provide additional protection from the sun.

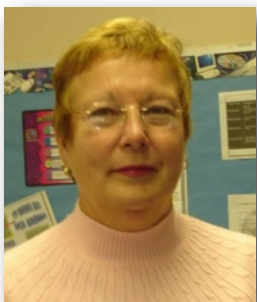
### **Use sunscreen.**

Apply a broad-spectrum sunscreen of SPF 15+ liberally and re-apply every two hours or after working, swimming, playing, or exercising outdoors.

Warm weather also means an increase in outdoor activities which create a greater risk for sports-related eye injuries. These injuries are the leading cause of blindness in school-age children. 72% of sports-related eye injuries happen to people who are 25 years and younger. Only 15% of children wear eye protection for sports activities. Baseball is the cause of the greatest number of sports-related eye injuries in children aged 14 and younger. Basketball is the leading cause of eye injuries for ages 15 to 24. 90% of sports-related eye injuries can be prevented with proper eye protection. Everyday prescription eye wear or sunglasses do not provide sufficient eye protection and fail to meet minimal impact requirements for sports. Instead, specially designed protective eye wear that meets rigid standards should be used. Eye doctors recommend lenses made of polycarbonate that carry the "American Society of Testing Materials" label. We celebrated the children's creativity by matting and displaying works of art in the Art Gallery. Each teacher introduced her class to an artist or type of art medium to study and explore. **Ms. Katie** and **Ms. Robin's** preschool classes used a variety of art media to create characters from Eric Carle books. **Mrs. Lenhart's** class used tempera and watercolors to reproduce A to Z letter paintings inspired by Jasper Johns. **Mrs. Wells's** class painted tissue paper, which was inspired by one of their favorite authors and illustrators, Eric Carle. **Ms. Kimmel's** class used colored glass to create mosaic designs, which was titled *Windows of Learning* inspired by Sonia King. **Mrs.**

Fourth grades visited President Harding's Memorial in Marion, Connor's Orchard in Bucyrus, and had lunch at the Harrison Smith Park in Upper Sandusky. Our fifth graders traveled to Columbus to visit the Statehouse and the Franklin Park Conservatory. They also watched the OSU Scarlet and Gray spring game in Ohio Stadium.

## Reading Counts

Our students have been reading up a storm. There are many students who have earned points and joined our Reading Counts Clubs. We are encouraging students to continue reading over the summer to keep their lexile levels the same for the beginning of the 2010-2011 school year.

Our fifth grade students began the transition between elementary school and middle school. One of the middle school teachers came to Hardin Central to talk with the students about life at the middle school. The students then spent one morning at KMS experiencing the sights and sounds of their soon-to-be new school. The last week of school was special for the fifth graders as they participated in many additional activities. **Mr. Collins** took the fifth graders to the KMS track for a fifth grade track meet. The students also visited the YMCA to swim for an afternoon.

## Field Day

The students enjoyed Field Day on June 1. Many of our parents came to supervise the field events as the classes proceeded from one event to another. The afternoon found all of the students and staff at the year-end assembly with **Mrs. Brien** handing out academic awards, and **Mr. Collins** handing out fitness awards.

## KMS Students Complete Special Activities

Ms. Ritzler's 7th grade students did an experiment with rockets. They took a film container and wrapped the net of a cylinder and cone around it to look like a rocket. Then they went outside, combined the fuel in the ratio of  $\frac{1}{2}$  water and  $\frac{1}{4}$  an antacid tablet in the rocket, and shook them. The class estimated how high the rockets went. The highest one went over 30 feet high based on the height of part of our school building.

Ms. Ritzler's 7th grade study skills class did skits to show reflections over the x-axis or y-axis by using two people miming across an imaginary coordinate plane. Motions were involved in various quadrants (I, II, III, & IV) at specific ordered pairs (x,y). Some partners even dressed alike. The law of reflection says that for specular reflection, the angle at which the wave is incident on the surface equals the angle at which it is reflected.

Mirrors can help students understand reflection. When you reflect someone, or something, you reflect at the same time, same distance and the same motions yet opposites. The project was fun as the students presented the skits to the class.

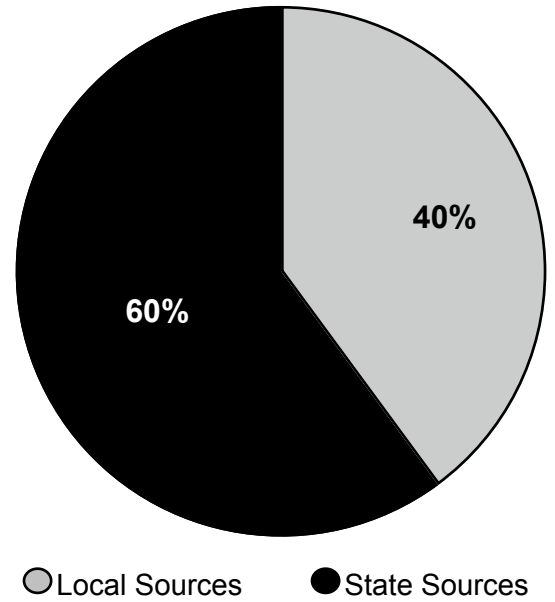

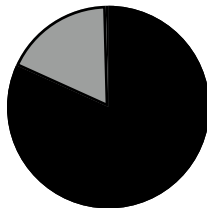

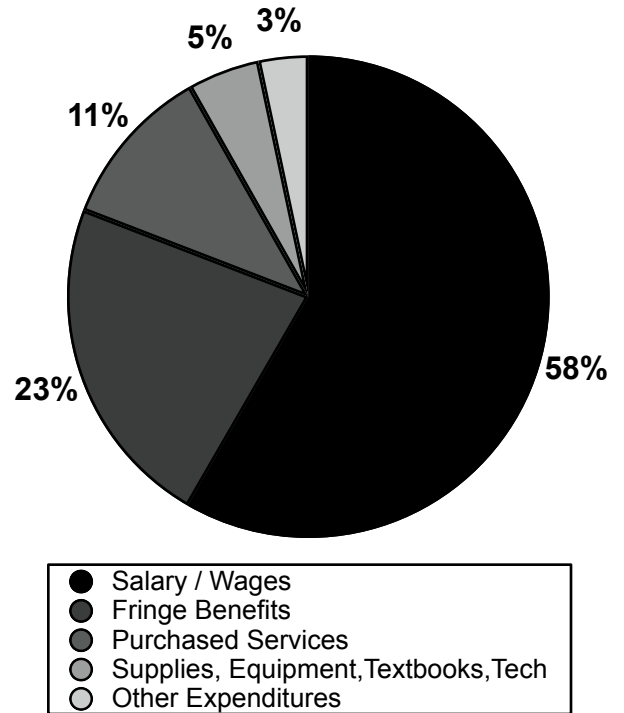

- Sign up for a Kroger Rewards Account by entering your zip code, clicking on favorite store, entering your e-mail account, creating a password, and agreeing to the terms and conditions.
- You will then get a message to check your e-mail box.
- Leave the Kroger website and go to your e-mail account and open the message from Kroger and click on the link in the e-mail that will take you back to the Kroger Website.
- Click on "My Account" (the one you just created) and put in your e-mail address and password to proceed to the next step.
- Click on "Edit Kroger Community Rewards Information" and input your Kroger Plus Card number.

- To verify you are enrolled correctly, you will see Kenton City Schools' name on the right side of your information page, and it will print at the very bottom of you Kroger receipt each time you shop.
